Note from Pastor.... EASTER EGGS

Eggs are traditionally connected with rebirth, rejuvenation and immortality. This is why they are often associated with Easter. "Eggs were colored, blessed, exchanged and eaten as part of the rites of spring long before Christian times. Even the earliest civilizations held springtime festivals to welcome the sun's rising from its long winter sleep. They thought of the sun's return from darkness as an annual miracle and regarded the egg as a natural wonder and a proof of the renewal of life. As Christianity spread, the egg was adopted as a symbol of Christ's Resurrection from the tomb. For centuries, eggs were among the foods forbidden by the church during Lent, so it was a special treat to have them again at Easter. In Slavic countries, baskets of food including eggs are traditionally taken to church to be blessed on Holy Saturday or before the Easter midnight Mass, then taken home for a part of Easter breakfast. People in central European countries have a long tradition of elaborately decorated Easter eggs. Polish, Slavic and Ukrainian people create amazingly intricate designs on the eggs. They draw lines with a wax pencil or stylus, dip the egg in color and

repeat the process many times to make true works of art. Every dot and line in the pattern has a meaning. Yugoslavian Easter eggs bear the initials "XV" for "Christ is Risen," a traditional Easter greeting. The Russians, during the reign of the tsars, celebrated Easter much more elaborately than Christmas, with Easter breads and other special foods and quantities of decorated eggs given as gifts.

In Germany and other countries of central Europe, eggs that go into Easter foods are not broken, but emptied out. The empty shells are painted and decorated with bits of lace, cloth or ribbon, then hung with ribbons on an evergreen or small leafless tree. On the third Sunday before Easter, Moravian village girls used to carry a tree decorated with eggshells and flowers from house to house for good luck. The eggshell tree is one of several Easter Traditions carried to America by German settlers especially those who became known as Pennsylvania Dutch. They also brought the fable that the Easter bunny delivered colored eggs for good children. Easter is an especially happy time for children and many Easter customs are for their enjoyment. Hunting Easter eggs hidden around the house or yard is a universal custom and so are egg-rolling contests." _ _ _ Easter eggs, American Egg Board

There are many other traditions surrounding Easter but my favorite was a homemade tradition. A dozen colored plastic eggs were placed in an egg carton. Eleven of them filled with trinkets or coins. Each child picked an egg and got to keep the prize inside. The empty egg was called the "Tomb Egg." The point was to show that all the trinkets of life had no meaning without the empty tomb. Mary Magdalene, the one who saw the empty tomb on the first Easter got it all - the promise of salvation given in person by the savior of the world.

*Don't worry if you got the empty egg you weren't left out. You won the largest Easter surprise that had been kept hidden from before the celebration. It was always something awesome - because the gift of the empty tomb is the most awesome thing of all. Happy Resurrection Day!

CEMETERY CLEAN UP DAY:

Mark your calendars for the next Cemetery Clean Up Day, **Saturday, March 23rd, 9 AM to 12 PM.**

Bring some work gloves, bug spray and water. We'll be picking up sticks, trimming bushes and cleaning headstones. Elders Behl and Kirkman, both graduates of the Florida Public Archaeology Network's Cemetery Resource Protection Training, will teach proper cleaning techniques. We'll also need folks to put new American flags on the graves of our veterans buried there.

Many of you know that our historic cemetery was the site of the original KPC church, formally organized in 1859. The earliest date of death on the headstones in the cemetery belongs to John Haile, who died in 1867 at the age of 19. Recently, your cemetery elders Kaley Behl and Karen Kirkman made a discovery that predates the founding of KPC! A United States One Cent Piece dated 1849! It is made of 100% copper. How did it get there? We'll never know. The road on the west side of the cemetery (SW 63rd Blvd) was once a military road used in the 1830s and 40s during the Seminole Wars to connect the forts near Micanopy to Ft Clarke (off Newberry Road) and the county seat at the time, Newnansville. It's possible someone traveling along the road dropped it. Or one of the founders of KPC dropped the coin when the original church was built in 1859. Though the coin is not worth lots of money. it was surely a spectacular find! Check out the pictures of it!



History of St. Patrick



St. Patrick was born in Britain-not Ireland-to wealthy parents

near the end of the fourth century. He is believed to have died on March 17, around 460 A.D. Although his father was a Christian deacon, it has been suggested that he probably took on the role because of tax incentives and there is no evidence that Patrick came from a particularly religious family.

At the age of 16, Patrick was taken prisoner by a group of Irish raiders who were attacking his family's estate. They transported him to Ireland where he spent six years in captivity. (There is some dispute over where this captivity took place. Although many believe he was taken to live in Mount Slemish in County Antrim, it is more likely that he was held in County Mayo near Killala.) During this time, he worked as a shepherd, outdoors and away from people. Lonely and afraid, he turned to his religion for solace, becoming a devout Christian. (It is also believed that Patrick first began to dream of converting the Irish people to Christianity during his captivity.)

After more than six years as a prisoner, Patrick escaped. According to his writing, a voice—which he believed to be God's—spoke to him in a dream, telling him it was time to leave Ireland.


To do so, Patrick walked nearly 200 miles from County Mayo, where it is believed he was held, to the Irish coast. After escaping to Britain, Patrick reported that he experienced a second revelation—an angel in a dream tells him to return to Ireland as a missionary. Soon after, Patrick began religious training, a course of study that lasted more than 15 years. After his ordination as a priest, he was sent to Ireland with a dual mission: to minister to Christians already living in Ireland and to begin to convert the Irish. (Interestingly, this mission contradicts the widely held notion that Patrick introduced Christianity to Ireland.)

Familiar with the Irish language and culture, Patrick chose to incorporate traditional ritual into his lessons of Christianity instead of attempting to eradicate native Irish beliefs. For instance, he used bonfires to celebrate Easter since the Irish were used to honoring their gods with fire. He also superimposed a sun, a powerful Irish symbol, onto the Christian cross to create what is now called a Celtic cross, so that veneration of the symbol would seem more natural to the Irish.

Although there were a small number of Christians on the island when Patrick arrived, most Irish practiced a nature-based pagan religion. The Irish culture centered around a rich tradition of oral legend and myth. When this is considered, it is no surprise that the story of Patrick's life became exaggerated over the centuries—spinning exciting tales to remember history has always been a part of the Irish way of life.

He may be known as the patron saint of Ireland, but Patrick was never actually canonized by the Catholic Church. This is simply due to the era he lived in. During the first millennium, there was no formal canonization process in the Catholic Church. After becoming a priest and helping to spread Christianity throughout Ireland, Patrick was likely proclaimed a saint by popular acclaim.

Mint S'mores Brownies

Prep: 15 mins Bake: 24 mins Serves: 24 brownies **INGREDIENTS:**

- 1 9x13 brownie mix
- ¹/₄ cup water
- ²/₃ cup oil
- 2 large eggs
- ¹/₂ cup Andes Mint Baking Chips
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows
- 2 cups chopped Thin Mint or Keebler grasshopper cookies
- ³/₄ cup mint M&M candies

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a 9x13 pan with nonstick baking spray.
- 2. Combine the marshmallows and cookie chunks in a bowl and set aside.
- 3. Beat the brownie mix, water, oil, and eggs until mixed. Stir in the Andes chips.
- Bake for 20 minutes. Remove from the oven. 4.
- Top with the marshmallow cookie mixture. Place 5. back in the oven for 4 minutes longer. Turn the oven to broil. Broil for 30 seconds to 1 minute, watching very carefully. Remove as soon as the marshmallows start to turn golden.
- 6. Press the M&M's into the warm marshmallows. Let cool completely.
- 7. Use a wet knife to cut the brownies into squares. Store in a sealed container on the counter.

Corned Beef and Cabbage with Herb Buttered Potatoes

Prep Time: 10 min Serves: 4 Cook Time: 8 hrs **INGREDIENTS: Corned Beef**

- 3 pounds corned beef • brisket with spice packet
- 2 carrots, cut into 2-inch pieces
- 2 medium onions, chopped **DIRECTIONS**:
- 1 small head green cabbage, Corned Beef:
- cored, roughly chopped
- 2 cups apple juice 1 cup water

- 1 1/2 pounds baby red • potatoes, sliced in 1/2
- 1/2 stick butter, softened 1 tablespoon chopped garlic

Shepherd's Pie Potatoe Bowls

Prep Time: 40 min

Cook Time: 15 min Serves: 4 **INGREDIENTS:**

- 4 large russet potatoes (about 3 pounds)
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter plus
- 1 tablespoon melted butter

DIRECTIONS:

Prick the potatoes all over 1. with a fork and brush them with 1 tablespoon melted butter. Put on a microwavesafe plate and microwave, flipping halfway, until fork tender, about 20 minutes. (Alternately, bake in the oven at 400 degrees F on a baking sheet until cooked through and fork tender, about 1 hour.) Let cool slightly.



- 1/4 cup whole milk
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh chives
 - 1 small carrot, chopped
 - 12 ounces ground beef chuck
 - 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 tablespoon tomato paste
 - 1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves
 - 1/3 cup frozen peas, thawed

Cut a 1/4-inch-thick slice off the top of each potato. Carefully scoop out the flesh into a medium bowl and mash with the milk, sour cream, 2 tablespoons butter and 1 teaspoon salt using a fork or potato masher. Fold in the chives. Put the potato bowls on a baking sheet. Preheat the oven to 400 degrees F. Meanwhile, melt 1 tablespoon butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the carrots and cook, stirring occasionally, until softened and lightly browned, 5 to 6 minutes. Add the beef and cook, breaking it up with a wooden spoon, until cooked through, about 4 minutes. Stir in the Worcestershire, tomato paste, thyme, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 cup water and bring to a boil, and then reduce heat and cook until the beef and carrots are coated in sauce with a little extra sitting on the bottom of the pan, about 1 minute. Stir in the peas until heated through, 1 to 2 minutes more.

Spoon the beef mixture into the potato bowls. Spoon or pipe the mashed potatoes on top of the beef mixture and bake until heated through and the potatoes brown on top, about 15 minutes. Cut the remaining tablespoon of butter into 4 slices and top each potato with one.

Put the carrots and onions on the bottom of slow cooker, and put the corned beef on top. Arrange the chopped cabbage around the beef. Add the apple juice and 1 cup of water along with the contents of the spice packet. Cook on low 6 to 8 hours until the beef is tender. Remove the beef and vegetables to a platter and keep warm.

Potatoes:

- Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil and add the 2. potatoes. Cook until the potatoes are tender, about 12 to 15 minutes. Drain and return them to the pot.
- 3. Add the butter, garlic, parsley, and salt, and pepper, to taste. Gently combine so that all the potatoes are evenly coated. Transfer to a serving bowl and serve with corn beef and vegetables from the slow cooker.

St. Patrick's Day Fun Facts >>>

The Real St. Patrick Was Born in Britain Much of what is known about St. Patrick's life has been interwoven with folklore and legend. Historians generally believe that St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain (not Ireland) near the end of the 4th century. At age 16 he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and sold as a slave to a Celtic priest in Northern Ireland. After toiling for six years as a shepherd, he escaped back to Britain. He eventually returned to Ireland as a Christian missionary. Leprechauns Are Likely Based on Celtic Fairies The red-haired, green-clothed Leprechaun is commonly associated with St. Patrick's Day. The original Irish name for these figures of folklore is "lobaircin," meaning "small-bodied fellow." Belief in leprechauns likely stems from Celtic belief in fairiestiny men and women who could use their magical powers to serve good or evil. In Celtic folktales, leprechauns were cranky souls, responsible for mending the shoes of the other fairies. The Shamrock Was Considered a Sacred Plant

The shamrock, a three-leaf clover, has been associated with Ireland for centuries. It was called the "seamroy" by the Celts and was considered a sacred plant that symbolized the arrival of spring. According to legend, St. Patrick used the plant as a visual guide when explaining the Holy Trinity. By the 17th century, the shamrock had become a symbol of emerging Irish nationalism.

The First St. Patrick's Day Parade Was Held in America

While people in Ireland had celebrated St. Patrick since the 1600s, the tradition of a St. Patrick's Day parade began in America and actually predates the founding of the United States.

Records show that a St. Patrick's Day parade was held on March 17, 1601 in a Spanish colony in what is now St. Augustine, Florida. More than a century later, homesick Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched in Boston in 1737 and in New York City on March 17.

Chicago Literally Runs Green For ST. PATRICK'S DAY.

The city has been celebrating St. Patrick by dumping green dye into the Chicago River since 1962.

Corned Beef and Cabbage Was an American Innovation

The meal that became a St. Patrick's Day staple across the country-corned beef and cabbage-was an American innovation. While ham and cabbage were eaten in Ireland, corned beef offered a cheaper substitute for impoverished immigrants.
